To emphasize our academic sense of urgency, the Board of Education set one goal last year. Increase the graduation rate 15% percent over three years beginning with the 2012 rate of 58%. And, the State identified us as a FOCUS district due to our low graduation rate over time. We are being challenged to reach our target by creating a community which works together so all Hudson City School District students will reach their highest potential and graduate ready for life beyond our school walls.

**Destination Graduation...**A journey that cannot be left to plan in the corridors and classrooms of our high school. The first steps must begin in kindergarten. It is a thirteen-year walk from building the fundamentals of the alphabet and number system to the critical thinking needed to grapple with complex text and mathematics.

The school board is focused on a future where students arrive fully prepared for success in the 21st century interconnected age. Our conceptual model of schooling is grounded in the responsible investment of resources to drive continuous improvement. Through our shared vision, we commit to providing a high quality education for all students. The vision's rationale comes from applying recent and relevant research on best practices in teaching, learning and leading.

Five core beliefs pave the road to **Destination Graduation**. They are:

- -All students are worthy of intellectual respect with a rigorous curriculum;
- -Great teaching matters;
- -Quality education demands genuine appreciation of differences;
- -We are all learners and leaders: and
- -Parents are our partners.

The Hudson City School District, our communities and indeed the entire city rightly take pride in and celebrate diversity and acceptance. In a predominantly rural county, we stand out as a small microcosm of the world. Our students are male, female, gay and straight. Our students are white, yellow, brown and black. They come from functioning families, dysfunctional homes, and some are homeless. They come from the working middle class and from the unemployed impoverished class. Our students are gifted with the need to be challenged. They are disabled with special needs. They come from 13 countries and speak nine different languages. It is important to remind ourselves that these are our students. They belong to the Bluehawk family. It will take herculean efforts to get there, but together we are extraordinarily powerful in the lives of our children.

The future of teaching and learning calls for aligning quality instruction in our classrooms with the common core of creativity, collaboration, and communication. Student success depends on the collective capacity of our hardworking and committed teachers and investing in them is an essential priority. But, as responsible stewards of taxpayer dollars, we must continuously improve how we run our district by making everyone accountable for results. To this end, we are establishing benchmarks and setting expectations to meet and exceed them. Our goal is to achieve the lowest-cost operations possible while improving the quality of services delivered to our schools. No easy task, but if done properly, this will result in more money available to spend on our children.

This is not the superintendent's plan. This is not even the school board's plan. This is the plan of the Hudson City School District and the communities that make it up for the future of education and our children. We must call on everyone to play a role in the continued transformation of our school system and the goal we have embraced.

#### A Message from Dr. King, NYS Commissioner of Education:

Dear New York State Parents and Families,

We have released, our 2013 test results. You will notice that more students struggled on this year's test than in previous years. This is because we changed the expectations for New York State students when we adopted the Common Core State Standards. The Board of Regents adopted these standards in 2010 and teachers and principals have been working to make important changes in student learning over the last 3 years. It is exciting that these changes have already begun, but our test results tell us that we have a long way to go.



We are making this change to the Common Core State Standards because we want every single one of our students to be on track for college and careers by the time they graduate from high school. Our former standards did not prepare all of our students for 21st century college and careers. The Common Core State Standards will:

- help students gain the knowledge and skills that they need to think and work at that deeper level
- create opportunities for all students to excel at reading, writing, speaking, listening, language and math
- support students to think critically about what they read and the math that they do
- allow teachers and students to focus on fewer critical concepts in mathematics more deeply
- build students' abilities to apply what they have learned to the real world
- ensure that all students can communicate strong ideas and arguments in writing and react powerfully to what they read

The Common Core State Standards are new, challenging standards and we know that students won't be able to meet these standards without the support of teachers, parents and communities. In particular, we have been working with teachers and principals to understand how instruction should change to get students where they need to be. Teachers and principals have been working to make these important changes to help their students to achieve at higher levels.

You have likely seen and will continue to experience noticeable changes in what and how your child is learning in school. This could include what you see in classrooms, finished work that comes home, or even homework assigned to your child. We have created a *Parents Backpack Guide to Common Core Standards* to help you look for these changes and many other resources to help support your children's learning (see http://www.engageny.org/parent-and-family-resources). For a better sense of what the Common Core looks like in action in classrooms across the state, see the short video entitled "Teaching is the Core" at: http://www.engageny.org/resource/teaching-is-the-core.

I want to make it very clear that the change in test scores (including, possibly, one in your child's score) does not mean that students are learning less or that teachers and schools are performing worse than last year. Proficiency rates – the percentage of students meeting or exceeding the standards – on the new Common Core assessments cannot be compared with last year's proficiency results since the old scores are from an old test based on the former standards. This is a new beginning and starting point that will provide better, clearer information to parents, teachers, and principals about what our children know and are able to do. The results from these assessments will help you and your school directly address the learning needs of your child so that he or she gets and/or stays on track for college and career success.

Parent reports are currently being prepared and will be sent to you near the start of the school year. With these reports, we will provide you with detailed information on how best to understand the results and resources that you can use to help support next steps for your child.

We all want the same thing: for all of our children to succeed in 21st century college and careers, to be good citizens, and to contribute to their community. The changes that we are making now provide us a new opportunity to make sure that every single New York State student graduates from high school prepared and able to make choices about his or her own future in a dynamic and competitive economy. Seeing a change in scores can be challenging for any parent, school, community, or state, but we know that where we are now only marks a beginning.

It is my great honor to work for you and your child every day.





#### Project Connect

Project Connect joins students, schools, and communities to make a powerful statement about uniting against bullying. The process is simple. Students write a message on a strip of **ORANGE** construction paper.



• Cut sheets of 8  $\frac{1}{2}$  x 11 **ORANGE** construction paper into strips of 1  $\frac{1}{2}$ " to 2" wide and 11" long. The strips are then stapled or glued together, resulting in one long, connected chain that visually represents the power of uniting for a common cause.

Here are two options or create your own!

- Ask students to write what they do to make their school a safe place for their peers.
  - -The message is while one person can speak out against bullying, our message is much stronger when we come together to make a difference.
- Ask students to write a quality they have that makes them proud to be who they are.



## HUDSON CITY SCHOOL DISTRICT SAFETY PROCEDURES

We want to bring a few specific points related to school visitors to your attention:

- All visitors and school employees shall wear identifying badges prominently displayed on their person at all times on school property during the course of their duties.
- All visitors entering a school building shall report to the appropriate office, sign in on the visitor's log and show positive identification (e.g. drivers' license).
- A visitor's badge will be issued only when a drivers' license or an item of equivalent value (e.g. keys, cell phone) is exchanged for the badge.
- The visitor is required to display the identification badge in a prominent fashion on their person at all times while on campus.
- At the conclusion of the visitor's business, they shall return to the office to sign out on the visitor's log, return their badge and receive their collateral property.

<u>Visitors</u> who do not comply with the district's requirement for identification shall be asked to leave school grounds.

The purpose of the access control system is to enhance building security and ensure that each visitor has legitimate business with the school district.

The safety of our students is our primary concern.
